As other research infrastructures, the GGS fieldwork has been affected by the current pandemic. The planning and implementation of the data collection continue nonetheless. We are now close to start the fieldwork in Norway, the Czech Republic, Denmark and Sweden. In addition, Hong Kong, France and Estonia are about to start fieldwork pilots. Other countries, such as Germany and Uruguay, are also preparing for fieldwork. As to Moldova, it is currently finishing its data collection.


GGP included in the Polish national roadmap
